Top 5 benefits of rehabilitation facilities

1. Veterinary supervision

Rehabilitation at a veterinary facility allows for close monitoring of your horse's progress. While the veterinarian may not be seeing your horse daily, experienced staff and veterinary technicians are monitoring your horse and relaying regular updates to the attending veterinarian, and any concerns can be quickly communicated. These facilities also have access to a network of referral specialists if advanced consultation is needed.

In addition, these facilities typically have on-site access to diagnostic equipment, medications (for refills or medication adjustments), and a variety of sedation options for horses that may become unsettled during stall rest or early hand walking and turnout phases.

2. Experienced handlers

Even the most well-behaved horses can become challenging during rehabilitation. Stall rest, limited turnout, and restricted exercise can lead to frustration and unpredictable behaviour.

Staff at veterinary rehabilitation facilities are trained and experienced in safely handling horses through all phases of recovery. With proper safety equipment, supervision, and teamwork, these professionals help ensure both

horses and humans stay safe during this sometimes-tricky process.

3. Purpose-built facility design

These resources can streamline your horse's progress and offer a level of care and equipment that may not be available at your home facility.

4. Streamlined routine

We all know horses love a good routine – and their friends. At your home facility, it can be difficult to manage a rehab horse's needs while others are following a regular turnout schedule. Veterinary rehabilitation facilities are used to managing horse schedules around ensuring that horses have company while they are in their stalls, being hand walked, or being turned out.

These facilities also typically operate on the same schedule every day, offering your horse a level of consistency that may not be provided at home simply because many home facilities can't operate around a single horses' rehab routine.
